Representations of Islam in the News Jul 16 2022 The representation of Islam is unquestionably a critical test for comparing journalistic reporting across countries and cultures. The Islamic religion has weight in international reporting (defining what we termed "foreign Islam"), but it is also the religion of numerically important minority groups residing in Europe ("national Islam"). The first part of the book is "setting the scene." Three chapters provide insights in dominant patterns of the representation of Islam as detected by various authors and studies involved with Islam

representation in Europe. Part two, the core section of the book, contributes to the development of the field of comparative journalism studies by comparing several countries and six media systems in Western Europe: the Dutch-speaking part of Belgium (Flanders), the French-speaking part of Belgium (Wallonia), the Netherlands, France, Germany, and the U.K. Part three of this book presents two reception studies, one qualitative and the other quantitative. Equally important, as the bulk of attention goes to Western Europe, is the extension towards the representation of Muslims and Islam outside Western Europe. Part four of the book is devoted to the representation of Islam in some of the so-called BRICs-countries: Russia, China, and India.

Media Authoring and Othering on Islam and Muslims in Malaysian Chinese Newspapers Oct 19 2022 This work studies the media authoring and Othering on Islam and Muslims in Malaysian Chinese newspapers, the Sin Chew Daily and Oriental Daily, beginning from 1st Jan 2011 to 30th April 2011. Specifically, this work attempts to discover how news narratives on Islam and Muslims are being authored, to explore the narratives of preferred authoring on Othering, to extract practices of authoring, and to understand the Chinese newspapers logic of authoring with regard to the Other. Qualitative methodology is being employed as the framework of study with the theories of Boundaries and Othering narratives as its underpinning theories. Data analysis revolves around four types of Othering narratives, as adopted and adapted from Kamppi

(2008), with hermeneutics being used as a device of knowing. The four types of Othering were the narrative of violence, the colonialist narrative, the narrative of secularism and the narrative of clash of culture. The study found that the grand narrative of both newspapers were on the distorted imagination about the Islamic state and Islamic law of Hudud. It suffices to say the authoring on Islam and Muslims in these two newspapers is a 'played' work with a purpose, perhaps to create anxieties or moral panic within the border for the political and social advantages of a certain group within the readers' larger community. Knowingly or unknowingly, both newspapers were and are boundary-makers. In this regard readers were kept 'captive' by the specified authored knowledge on Islam and Muslims within the border. Simply, authoring in both newspapers were preferred authoring with preferred meaning, which promotes or suggest a constructed logic-interest of presentation.

Islamophobia in Non-Western Online Newspapers Jan 22 2023 The media attention towards Islam has increased recently, but meeting the quality standards in reporting the religion is often of great concern in this regard. This issue has been debated since the aftermath of violent incidents such as the 9/11 attacks in 2001, the Afghanistan War in 2002, the Iraq War in 2003, the Danish cartoon row in 2005, the London bombings in 2005, the Paris attacks in 2015, and the New Zealand shootings in 2017. In reporting violence, the media tend to construct a negative image of Islam, which is likely to reproduce unfounded hostility
